COMMITTEE OF 100 PLUS CIVIC LEADERS CALLS FOR FEINSTEIN LEGACY TRIBUTE:

PROCESS BEGINS TO NAME SAN FRANCISCO'S INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT TERMINAL IN HER HONOR

The Dianne Feinstein 100 plus Committee, chaired by former San Francisco Mayor and former California Assembly Speaker Willie L. Brown, Jr., today announced a campaign to salute the remarkable legislative achievements enacted by U.S. Senator Dianne Feinstein during her nearly 32 years in the Senate.

The campaign recognizes her outstanding leadership in urban stability during tumultuous times, confronting and coping humanely with the AIDS epidemic, as well as instituting significant environmental improvements that protect the Mojave Desert and Lake Tahoe.

"It's time to pay homage and to say Thank You to a woman leader who broke barriers and glass ceilings galore throughout her 45-year public service career," Brown declared.

"From her restoration of public confidence and urban calming following the Moscone-Milk assassinations in San Francisco in 1978, to her impressive efforts to work with the gay and lesbian community and public health workers to stop the AIDS epidemic in the 1980s, her skillful bipartisan leadership that passed the nation's first assault weapons' ban in 1994, and her wake-up revelatory 2014 Intelligence Committee Report on the CIA's Torture Program, Dianne Feinstein's public services leadership made—and continues to make to this day—dramatic differences that have enhanced our nation's, our State's and our city's quality of life."

In addition to these important legislative achievements, and among many other vital initiatives, U.S. Senator Feinstein also authored the Senate version of the Respect for Marriage Act signed into law in 2022 that repealed the discriminatory Defense of Marriage Act, as well as won reauthorization through 2027 of the bipartisan Violence Against Women Act that protects women from domestic violence and sexual assault.

"Our committee of 100 plus prominent San Franciscans and Californians, whose names are listed in the attachment below, include Mayor London Breed, as well as former San Francisco Mayors Art Agnos, Frank Jordan, Mark Farrell and myself," Brown added. "The Committee reflects our nation's cornucopia of diverse community leaders who represent the full spectrum of businesses, the arts, education and policy makers.

While the Dianne Feinstein 100 plus Committee began working on this legacy naming project several months ago, Senator Feinstein's sudden passing galvanized the Committee to move forward immediately to obtain the unanimous support of the San Francisco Airport Commission to rename San Francisco Airport's International Terminal after her at its earliest opportunity.
